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## National officer celebrates FFA Week in county

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MIDDLETOWN -- National FFA Secretary Landan Schaffert urged his peers Wednesday to pursue their dreams, despite obstacles they may encounter.

Schaffert, who is legally blind, said a doctor told his parents he would never read or write. His parents told him otherwise.

"My parents told me, 'if you work hard and believe in yourself, any dream you have can become a reality,'" Schaffert said at the National FFA Week Breakfast at Middletown High School. "It certainly has been true in my life."

This year's FFA theme, Infinite Potential, suggests each person has unlimited possibilities to make what they desire come true through hard work and determination, Schaffert said. He said the FFA helped him build good character, be organized and think critically.

"FFA has helped me with so many things in life. Believe in your infinite potential to make your wildest dreams realities," Schaffert said.

America has always been the breadbasket of the world, and the people gathered to celebrate the FFA will continue to make it happen, Middletown High School Principal Jay Berno said.

"World population is rising at such a fast rate it will take agriculture to cultivate the soil, produce food and raise livestock to feed the people of the world. And though a lot of people believe these FFA kids don't have the work ethic their parents had, that's not true," Berno said. "These kids have the mental toughness and discipline necessary to be successful in agriculture."

Frederick County Commissioners President Blaine Young attended the breakfast.

Following breakfast, Schaffert led an FFA officers workshop at Middletown High School and then traveled to the Frederick Career and Technology Center for lunch, where he participated in a series of afternoon workshops with chapter members in the county.

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
